Holiday Electrical Safety Tips

There are two main safety concerns with holiday decorations: fire load and electrical connections.

- Fire Load:
 - Decorations, including dried-out Christmas trees and presents, are highly flammable and can accelerate fire spread.
 - To mitigate fire risks:
 - Ensure smoke detectors have fresh batteries.
 - Avoid placing flammable items near the tree.
 - Consider using an artificial tree.
 - Unplug decorations when not monitored.
- Electrical Safety:
 - Holiday decorations may overload circuits and create spark risks, especially with extension cords under rugs.
 - Use LED lights and position decorations near outlets for easy unplugging.
 - Always unplug when leaving the house.
- Fire Extinguishers:
 - Keep a "K" rated fire extinguisher in the kitchen for grease fires.
 - Have a lid handy when frying, and avoid using water on grease fires.
- Heating Safety:
 - Space heaters are common in poorly heated homes but can cause fires if misused.
 - Ensure they are modern and have safety features, and never use extension cords.
- Carbon Monoxide Risks:
 - Propane heaters can produce deadly carbon monoxide.
 - Use modern heaters with safety features and install carbon monoxide detectors.

Stay vigilant and prioritize safety to prevent holiday-related accidents.

Holiday Travel Tips

If you're planning to travel by car, try to avoid the peak travel times and follow these American Red Cross tips to help keep you safe:

- 1. Make sure your car is in good condition for a road trip.
- 2. Pack an emergency preparedness kit, supplies and a first aid kit in your vehicle.
- 3. Share travel plans with a family member or friend.
- 4. Check the weather before departing and along your route. Plan for travel around any storms that may be coming.
- 5. Be well rested and alert.
- 6. Buckle up, slow down and don't drive impaired.
- 7. Follow the rules of the road and use caution in work zones.
- 8. Give your full attention to the road. Avoid distractions such as cell phones.
- 9. Make frequent stops. During long trips, rotate drivers. If you're too tired to drive, stop and get some rest.
- 10. If you have car trouble, pull off the road as far as possible.
